



Minister





Message

Operating in difficult economic times, the lottery industry thrived in Alberta. Over the past fiscal year, sales exceeded \$315 million, and a net income greater than \$108 million was returned to the Alberta Lottery Fund for the continuing provision of beneficiary funding for community initiatives.

During fiscal 1991, Alberta Lotteries maintained an important role within the Western Canada Lottery Corporation. Our strategic thinking was aligned to reflect a broader, more progressive vision, resulting in a transition from traditional to innovative products. This vision included the development of sports wagering to complement our profitable on-line network and market research of video lottery, on-line keno, global lottery products, and instant ticket vending machines.

The structure of the Western Canada Lottery Corporation partnership was a critical issue, and its resolution vital to securing a strong lottery operation in Alberta. Supported by our corporate partners in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, the relocation of the Western Canada Lottery Corporation's marketing department to Stettler enabled us to deliver to Albertans proportionate economic benefits.

The Honourable Ken Kowalski, Minister Responsible for Lotteries, provided strong leadership and support. His guidance enabled the Board of Alberta Lotteries to build a vision for the future, providing even greater financial benefits for all Albertans.



I commend the management and staff of Alberta Lotteries for their enthusiasm and spirit shown during this time of growth. Their dedication proved invaluable in meeting the market challenge.

I thank the Board of Directors for their support during my first term as Chairman. It is also my pleasure, on behalf of the board, to acknowledge Mr. Howard MacDonald, Chairman of the Board of Directors for three years ending October, 1990. His dedication served to ensure the achievement and success of lotteries in Alberta. This success will flourish well into the future.



1991 Highlights

Sports Wagering A Hit

In October, 1990 Alberta Lotteries introduced sports wagering via a distinct network of 225 Alberta Lottery Ticket Centres. Following years of research in Western Canada, two games, Pro Line and Excel Hockey, were marketed under the umbrella name Sport Select. The games offered

players an opportunity to wager on the results of professional sporting events. This form of wagering had been popular for decades in many European countries; Sport Select was modeled after the Swedish game "Odd Set". Sports personality Don Cherry promoted the games, which generated more than \$11.5 million in sales revenue.

Alberta: The Winning Phenomenon

Fiscal 1991 was a "winning phenomenon" for everyone involved with Alberta Lotteries — retailers, winners and beneficiaries alike.

Alberta Lotteries flagship game, Lotto 6/49, generated 55 percent of lottery sales with revenue exceeding \$173.2 million. At the same time it produced an unprecedented number of Albertan winners during the summer of 1990. From June to September, 1990, eight Lotto 6/49 purchasers became instant millionaires.

There was one \$10 million winner, one \$6 million winner, three \$5 million winners, one \$2.1 million winner and two \$1 million winners.

Theme Games Instant Success

Offering a top prize of \$100,000, the new \$5 instant game Holiday Surprize was launched December, 1990. Instant \$1, \$2 and \$5 tickets produced \$60.1 million in total revenue.

Among instant theme games, the St. Patrick's Day ticket, launched March, 1991, was a cooperative venture with the British Columbia Lottery Corporation.

The Western Round-Up

In September, 1990, the traditional game Western Express evolved into an instant ticket product. Prior to the format change, the game had the longest-running history of all regional tickets. Sales revenue for 1990-91 reached \$15.2 million.

Lotto 6/36 Turns POGO

The final Lotto 6/36 draw was held March 27, 1991. Between April 1, 1987 and April 1, 1991 the game produced many Albertan winners, and generated \$43.3 million in sales revenue within Alberta. On March 28, 1991 Lotto 6/36 was replaced by POGO — "Pick One, Get One", a two-for-one-dollar lotto.

Retailers Meet Challenge

During the year, Alberta Lotteries 1,473 on-line Retailers met and matched, with great success, a complexity of market challenges, changing systems and new

products. As the market shifted to chain-dominant stores, mega stores and open-air community malls, retailers upgraded their product knowledge and sales skills, in order to provide outstanding service and reap the rewards of a job well done.


The Spirit of Alberta

During 1990, Alberta Lotteries introduced an updated corporate identity. Depicting the spirit of Alberta, the logo-mark was expressly created to reflect the fun and excitement of Alberta Lotteries, while uniting retail and beneficiary programs under one dedicated banner.

Supporting World Class Hockey

Canada's National Hockey Team and the Soviet Union Olympic Team participated in an eight-game series in Alberta, January 3 to 13, 1991. Made possible, in part, through a Corporate Sponsorship by Alberta Lotteries, the tour presented a unique

opportunity for rural Alberta communities to witness live world-class hockey. Tour stops included Taber, Lloydminster, Ft. McMurray, Grande Prairie, Barrhead, Drumheller and Stettler, and concluded with the Calgary Cup game at the Saddledome.

The sponsorship program will provide \$335,000 to Hockey Canada for a three-year period. Funds will support the International Hockey Centre of Excellence in Calgary and the hosting of Alberta tours.

Benefits For All

Albertans

All Albertans benefit from lottery product sales in the province.

The Alberta Lottery Fund, administered by the Government of Alberta, supports a variety of sport, artistic, cultural, recreational, health and wellness, agricultural, tourism, family and community-related projects initiated largely by non-profit and volunteer organizations across the province.

More than 2,500 lottery grants totalling over \$100 million were provided this year to enhance and enrich the quality of community and family life in Alberta. New beneficiaries of lottery funding in 1990-91 included the Alberta Environmental Research Trust, an organization which supports research projects to promote the quality of Alberta's environment. As well, the Science Alberta Foundation received a lottery grant to design community-based activities to promote science awareness and education.

Hundreds of community facilities throughout Alberta benefited from Community Facility Enhancement Program grants again this year. The Program, which commenced in 1988, was allocated \$100 million from Alberta's Lottery Fund to disburse over three years to non-profit and volunteer groups for the renovations, repair, expansion and upgrading of a wide variety of rural and urban community facilities throughout Alberta. These facilities support Albertans' active lifestyles and the community spirit which is found throughout the province.

Many lottery-funded agencies and foundations continue to participate in the disbursement of lottery revenues province-wide. Lottery grants are awarded by

the Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation, the Alberta Sport Council, the Alberta Art Foundation, the Wild Rose Foundation, the Team Tourism/Community Tourism Action Programs, the Alberta Multiculturalism Commission and the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation, among others.

Sharing in the spirit of friendly competition, the Alberta Summer Games brings developing athletes together from every corner of the province.



The foundations and agencies responsible for channelling lottery funds to beneficiaries have their own established application, review and evaluation processes. Though each has its own particular mandate, they share the common goal of working to provide lottery benefits for all Albertans.


Auditor's



Notes to Financial Statements

March 31, 1991

1. Nature of the Partnership

The Alberta Division is a partnership of Edmonton Northlands and the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede Ltd., and is licensed to act as the Provincial Marketing Organization in Alberta under the authority of the Lottery Licence, as issued by the Minister of the Government of Alberta responsible for the Interprovincial Lottery Act. The partners do not directly receive any portion of the net proceeds from lottery schemes in Alberta but do receive amounts as beneficiaries from the Lottery Fund at the discretion of the Minister. All assets of the Partnership are owned by the Government of Alberta.

The Alberta Division acts as agent of the Government of Alberta which is a member of the Western Canada Lottery Corporation. The Corporation provides, without financial gain, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, services concerning the conduct, management and operation of lottery schemes.

The Lottery Licence requires the Corporation to conduct, manage and operate in Alberta as the agent of the Government of Alberta such lottery schemes as designated by the Minister. The Corporation distributes the net proceeds arising from the sales of authorized lottery schemes in Alberta to the Lottery Fund in the manner prescribed in the Licence.

The Alberta Division has additionally agreed to provide facilities, personnel and resources to the Minister responsible for Lotteries to fulfill requirements for administering the Interprovincial Lottery Act and the Lottery Fund. These functions are administered by the Program and Services Office.

2. Statement of Lottery Operations in Alberta

The statement of lottery operations in Alberta is derived from the financial statements of the Western Canada Lottery Corporation. It reflects total lottery ticket sales in Alberta and the direct expenses related thereto such as the cost of prizes, tickets, administration and distribution. Net operating expenses represent the costs incurred by the Alberta Division in its capacity as Provincial Marketing Organization together with other costs relating to the conduct of its business, less interest income, retailer licensing fees and other income as well as costs incurred to provide facilities, personnel and resources to the Program and Services Office.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

- a) The cost of fixed assets acquired is charged to operations. No charge for depreciation is recorded. During the year the Alberta Division acquired fixed assets in the amount of \$62,819 (1990 - \$267,792).
- b) These financial statements do not include any assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the partners.

4. Term Deposits

Term deposits include \$128,704 (1990 - \$80,000) representing security deposits received from retailers. This amount is available to the Alberta Division should the retailers default on ticket payments.

5. Contingent Liability

The Alberta Division is contingently liable for lottery ticket inventory held on behalf of the Western Canada Lottery Corporation. At March 31, 1991, the Division's sales representatives held lottery tickets valued at \$574,548 (1990 - nil).

6. Excess of Advances from Western Canada Lottery Corporation Over Net Operating Expenses

This account represents advances from the Western Canada Lottery Corporation less net operating expenses.

7. Federal Tax

Taxes are paid to the Government of Canada in lieu of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) on lottery ticket sales based on a formula prescribed by legislation. This tax is in addition to the GST paid on the purchase of goods and services for which credit is denied under the formula.

8. Lease Commitments

The Alberta Division is committed to total minimum lease payments of approximately \$990,729 under operating leases over the next five years as follows: 1992 - \$334,525; 1993 - \$289,742; 1994 - \$246,816; 1995 - \$119,646; 1996 - nil.

9. Comparatives

Certain comparative figures have been restated to conform to the presentation adopted in the current year.

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ALBERTA *Lotteries*

The provincial government of Alberta is a member of the Western Canada Lottery Corporation, along with the governments of Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The Yukon Territory and the Northwest Territories participate within the Corporation as associate members. To assist the Corporation with the disbursement of lottery products in Western Canada, each provincial/territorial jurisdiction has appointed a lottery organization. Alberta's lottery organization is the Western Canada Lottery, Alberta Division, known as "Alberta Lotteries".
