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
Technology isn't enough – students need to learn actively!



Team-Based Learning (TBL) classroom University of Massachusetts Amherst (W.E.B. Du Bois Library; 1 of 2 pilot rooms on campus).





Layout based on MIT's Technology Enhanced Active Learning (TEAL) rooms but open to all disciplines across the curriculum.



Students at each table have three laptops, a large screen monitor to project to, and white board with camera to display their work on screens around the room.



Students participating in pilot team-based learning classes were asked the open-ended question: "Which elements of the new classroom do you prefer?"

The Ideal Teammate?

Pre-course survey response:

- Smart
- Experienced

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
At the beginning of the semester, students were asked what characteristics their 'ideal teammate' would have.

Post-course survey response:

- Willing to help
- Trustworthy, reliable, responsible
- Listens well, open-minded, cooperativepeople skills
- Hardworking, prepared, comes to class
- Enthusiastic, eager

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
After the semester had run its course, the students had a few things to add!




The UMass Amherst Learning Commons (LC) is immediately adjacent to the new TBL; students literally walk out of the classroom and into the Learning Commons -- http://www.library.umass.edu/learningcommons



Even outside the TBL classroom, new ways of working together takes shape amongst students organically. How can we help to foster growth?



Quantitative data isn't enough – in order to anticipate student needs and provide appropriate support, we need MORE. Pairing with the Anthropology Dept. to move in the direction of ethnographic research is our next step.



Finding out what student need before that need becomes a 'critical mass' is essential for staying ahead of the curve.



Multimedia (video, audio – digital storytelling/narratives) projects are becoming more prominent in the curriculum; EDUCAUSE (ELI) reports this as a trend in 2007.

Trend of Change

- First Year Writing (ENG112), Unit III
- Public History, Oral Histories
- Anthropology, Digital Narratives



At UMass Amherst, investigation of changing local trends begins in 2008 (with SWAT team investigation). Multimedia projects/assignments are cropping up in several courses/programs outside of the typical 'film/media' or art courses.

On the University of Massachusetts Amherst campus, there are several resources available for faculty looking to infuse their curriculum with multimedia projects. What about available support for our students??



The answer: NO. Though there may be 'pockets' of support on campus for students enrolled in specific programs (Communications, Art, etc), there is no multimedia support for the general student population.


