Take-Home Messages



- 1) Dog-bite injuries deserve more attention
 - Dog bites + fear of dogs can reduce mental, physical & social well-being
 - ☐<u>Children</u> at highest risk
 - Disadvantaged families + communities may suffer most
- 2) Policies can reduce dog-bite frequency + severity
- 3) Calgary = 'model city' for dog-bite prevention
- 4) Calgary's Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw will soon change
- 5) More cooperation could help reduce dog-bite problem
- 6) Housing access, affordability *might* help the dog-bite problem

Dog-Bite Injuries → **Overview**



- Global estimates of dog bite incidence don't exist
- Children more likely than adults to be bitten by dogs
- Children face higher risks of dog-bite injuries to the face, head and neck than in adults




Injuries associated with ... Non-Fatal Dog Bites 1990-2003, All ages

- 2/3rds of infants + toddlers (up to 4 years old) needed treatment because dogs had bitten their *faces, heads* &/or *necks*.
- More children between the ages of 5 & 9 received emergency treatment for dog-bite injuries than for *ice-hockey injuries*.
- In youth aged 10 through 14, dog-bite injuries accounted for more emergency department visits than *trampolining*.



Dog-Bite Injuries and Chases → in Calgary




- 2723 bites + chases confirmed by City of Calgary, 2012-2017
 - 14% coded as severe (~1 in 6)
 - 54 dogs in all (3%) euthanized after investigation
 - <u>Keep in mind</u>: Reports mainly arise from citizens
 - Many (most?) chases go unreported
 - Many (most?) dog-bite injuries go unreported (even when treated?)

Dog-Bite Injuries → in Calgary

"Dogs in all breed groups are capable of inflicting a bite, and the probability of a high severity bite was not significantly higher in any particular breed group."





Calgary > More Change Needed as a Model City



Coordination needed across sectors

Dog-bite data from Alberta Health Services + Public Health Agency of Canada didn't factor into Calgary's pet policy review (1 example)

2) Social Justice needs consideration

- Reinstate subsidies for spay/neuter !
 Introduce subsidies for pet licensing ?
 Address affordability, accessibility for veterinary care + dog training
 - Map dog complaints, injuries, licensing
 - City did map access for off-leash policy review


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


- balance in media coverage, starting with the CBC (Action 84)

 - Culling as tragic...
