The Calgary Region Hackathon is a three-day competition to develop a software solution (such as mobile apps, websites, or mapping products) using open data from the Calgary Region.

The Hackathon, now in its second year in Calgary, brings programmers, designers, developers, coders, cartographers and general enthusiasts together.

It's an opportunity to celebrate, collaborate and compete together, exploring new ways of connecting the Calgary Region.

This three-day event takes place, appropriately, on International Open Data Day; March 5th, 2016. It's open to anyone over the age of 18 with an interest in innovation and technology.

Flash your data talent

The Hackathon represents an amazing opportunity for the entire Region to showcase their talents, as both individuals or as part of a team.

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It also provides data enthusiasts a chance to see who and what's out there – as well as what types of communication distribution needs still exist.

With our province reeling from an uncertain economy, seeking new ways to make Alberta strong couldn't come at a better time.

It's an opportunity to network with leaders and up-and-comers within the online data community to create new economic avenues.

The Hackathon builds on the CRP and the City's commitment to transparent communication by engaging with those qualified in making information as accessible and user-friendly as possible.

Competition guidelines

The event, open to data enthusiasts of all professional abilities, follows a science fair format.

Teams of two to six can compete against others in the quest to find new and engaging ways to share information.

If you have expertise in the areas of data sharing, whether by profession, education or hobby – we want you to participate!

Registration for individuals is \$50 (\$35 for students) for the weekend and includes meals, snacks, and an unlimited supply of coffee!

The competition ends on Sunday with an on-stage presentation by the top five scoring teams. The winning teams will be awarded cash prizes for their efforts.

Prizes include:

- \$5000 for the winning team,
- \$2000 for second place,
- \$1000 for third,
- additional cash prizes of \$500 in six other categories!

Plus, the first 100 people to register receive a free swag bag.
