Canadian Gambling Digest: Addendum



The present document contains the following updates to the *Canadian Gambling Digest* (Canadian Partnership for Responsible Gambling, 2004):

Page 4: Table 8

In Saskatchewan, *Total Revenues* were \$55,685,851. Across the country overall, *Total Revenues* were \$1,074,332,537 (not \$1,057,205,610).

Page 4: Table 9

In Nova Scotia, *Slots Revenues* were \$32,426,551. In British Columbia, *Total Horse Racing (Tax) Revenues* were \$1,878,000 (not \$14,487,370), while *Total Revenues* were \$672,815,000 (not \$685,424,370). In Saskatchewan, *Total Ticket Lottery Revenues* were \$12,499,265 (not \$43,400,000) and *Total Revenues* were \$247,514,663 (not \$278,415, 398). Across the country overall, *Total Revenues* were \$6,282,345,227 (not \$6,325,855,332).

Page 5: Chart 2

In Saskatchewan, the *Percentage of Government Revenue Derived from Gaming* was 5.1 (not 5.7). Across the country overall, the average *Percentage of Government Revenue Derived from Gaming* was 3.2 (not 3.0).

Page 5: Table 10

In Alberta, *Total Revenues* were \$125,418,000 (not \$205,752,000). Across the country overall, *Total Revenues* were \$585,774,805 (not \$666,108,805).

Page 6: Table 11

In Saskatchewan, *Distributions to Charity* were \$33,267,624 (not \$15,300,000). In Nova Scotia, *Distributions to Charity* were \$239,000 (not \$39,000).

Page 6: Chart 3

In British Columbia, the *Percentage of Government Gaming Revenue Spent on Problem Gambling* was 0.49 (not 0.48). In Saskatchewan, the *Percentage* was 1.72 (not 1.53). Across the country overall, the average *Percentage of Government Gaming Revenue Spent on Problem Gambling* was 0.87 (not 0.85).

Page 8: Table 17

In Saskatchewan, the number of *Total Clients* was unavailable (not 687) and Total *Counsellors* was 16.5 (not 42).
