In 2004-2005 Amy Britton and Jean-Sebastien Windle were members of the first transcription team working on the Osborne manuscript drama. Andrew Bretz worked as dramaturg on the Department of Drama workshop production of the play. All three helped with our initial provenance investigations and presented our findings to the Pacific Northwest Renaissance Conference as well as to groups on campus and to the larger Calgary community.
