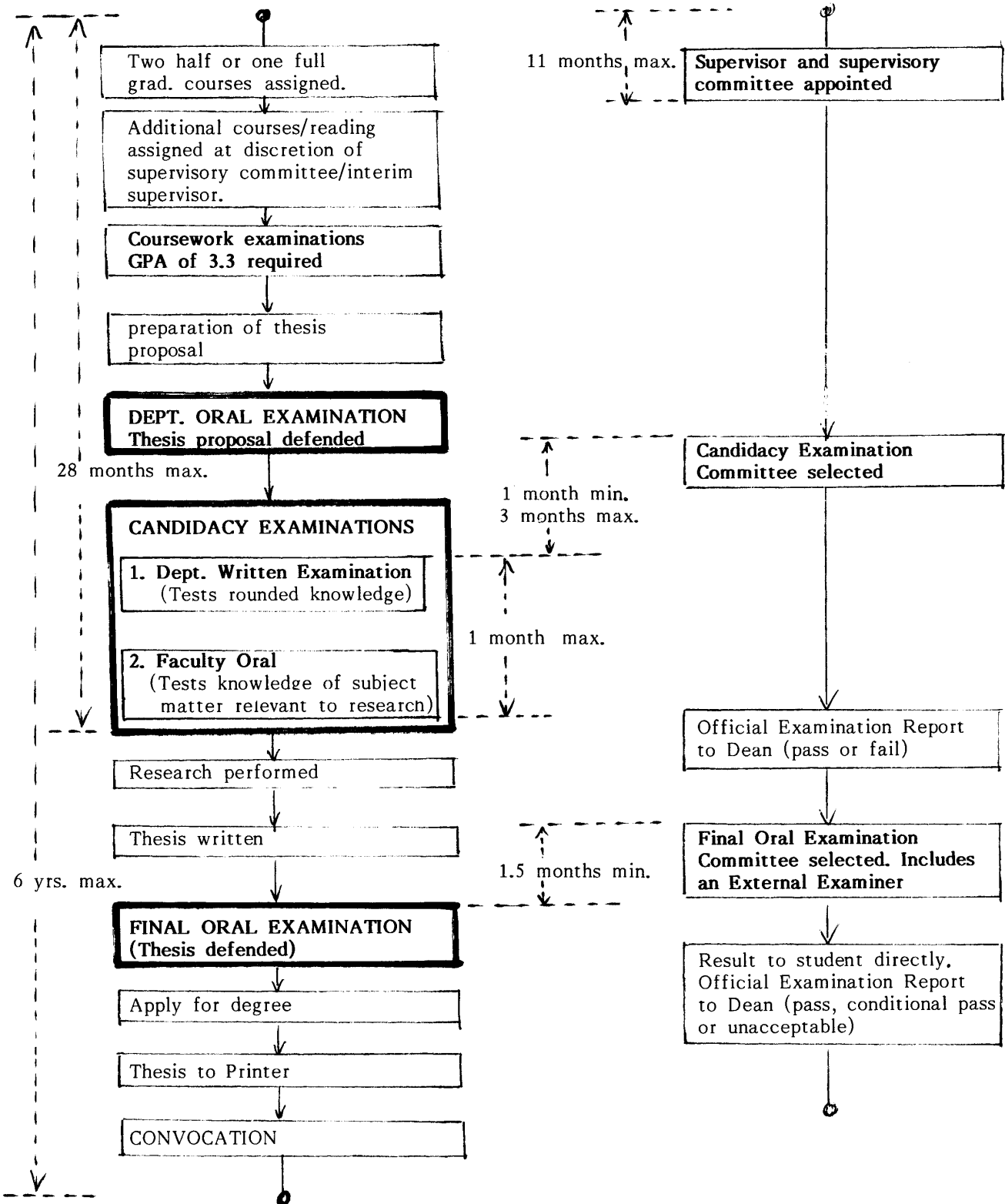

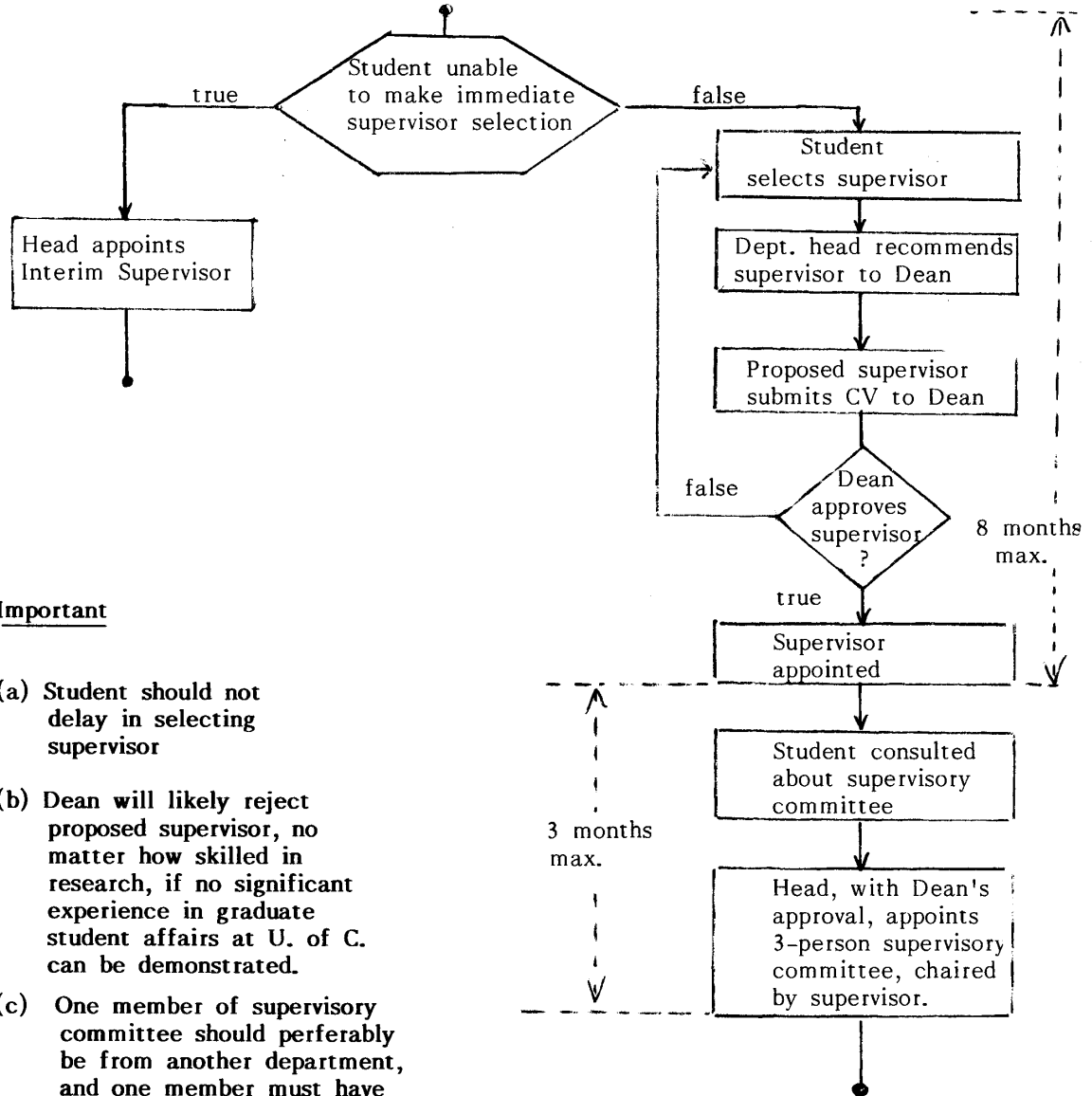

OVERVIEW OF Ph.D PROGRAM



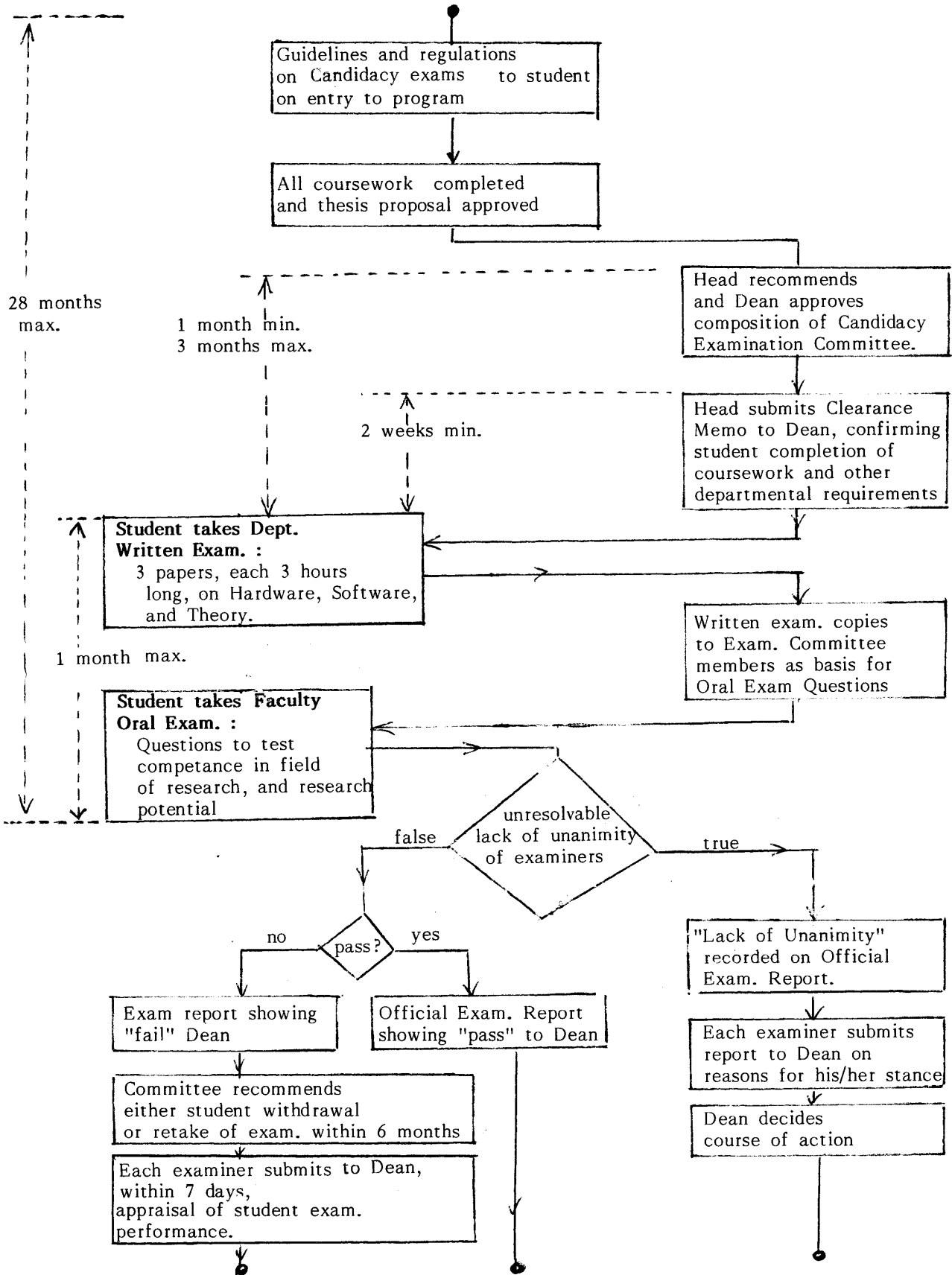
SELECTION OF SUPERVISOR AND SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE



Important

- (a) Student should not delay in selecting supervisor
- (b) Dean will likely reject proposed supervisor, no matter how skilled in research, if no significant experience in graduate student affairs at U. of C. can be demonstrated.
- (c) One member of supervisory committee should preferably be from another department, and one member must have completed supervision of a Ph. D. student.
- (d) A supervisor should not have more than 5 or 6 grad. students
- (e) CAVEAT to students:
A supervisor wears two conflicting hats.
 1. He/she guides, encourages, teaches student.
 2. He/she judges student performance, and chairs examination committees
